## Outline: CICASP Seminar 02 Mini-debate (2 of 2)

In this seminar we will hold a mini-debate. Elephants are being killed illegally for their ivory. China is the largest market, Japan the second largest. Ivory is used in Japan, currently, for hanku and for a musical instrument, the shamisen. Worldwide ivory is used for carved objects and in China for jewellery. Carved ivory dagger handles are also sold at high prices.

The question under debate is: Should the ban on elephant hunting be lifted, in order to allow the legal sale of ivory? If elephant-hunting for ivory were legalised, then it could be taxed and monitored.

At the seminar, you will be assigned to one side of the argument. This means that you might be defending a viewpoint opposite to your own. This gives better practise at debating and thinking critically.

## Arguments 'for' and 'against' whaling suggested by Seminar attendees:

Yes: Keep on Whaling	No: Stop Whaling
Only hunt non-endangered species	Protect biodiversity and endangered species
Whale meat is delicious	Alternative foods are available
Traditional practise	Long life history of whales
Employment/potential job losses within Japan	Animal welfare perspective – inhumane to kill them
