Grant Writing Masterclass

Writing grant is part of life as a researcher. You will write one such proposal at least every other year. Ikuma explained what makes the difference between being awarded the grant, or not. Beyond your proposed research and your scientific record, it is the written proposal itself that can put you a cut above your competition. Remember that the reviewers are human, make it easy for them to read and remember that they are unlikely to be specialists in your field. When checking over your own draft proposal, it is difficult to assess it as someone reading it for the first time without the relevant background. Reading others' applications can help you to see things from a reviewer's perspective and so improve your own grant writing skills. In an interactive activity, students examined an example first draft of a grant application: the section on past research achievements. Each pair spotted 3 good points about the draft along with 3 points that could be improved upon in later drafts. They shared these points with the class.

 (Ikuma will discuss applications in Japanese, after the main seminar)

- Frame it as if it is your own previous research achievement or your own future study
