The aim of this trip was to join the forum held at Tokiwa Zoo, Ube City, Yamaguchi prefecture and learn about the efforts for natural environment made by Ube City and the zoo.

Since I'm interested in what cities or zoos are doing with general citizens for education and public relations, I joined this forum. In the previous day of the forum, I could see the zoo. Although the zoo was not so big as other ones, its way to display animals was so elaborated, which enabled me to feel animals close. In particular, exhibition similar to animal's natural habitat was really impressive. Moreover, when I saw some things such as benches or trees donated by citizens or companies to the park, I found that people there value the park.

The forum consisted of a workshop, a lecture, and a zoo tour. In the workshop, participants could enjoy vertical jump, a monkey bar, a cognitive experiment of short-term memory, and measuring the volume of their voice, challenging animal's ability (Fig.2). I was in charge of the monkey bar, but I had my hands full preventing the participants from getting injured.
